A. to + infinitive (only positive statements when the two clauses have the same subject) in order to	We floss to clean plaque and food particles from in-between teeth and the gumline. After brushing it is advisable to rinse your mouth in order to perform a complete oral hygiene.
in order not to +infinitive (when the two clauses have the same subject)	The nurse has to brush the patient's teeth carefully in order not to affect the condition of the patient's teeth and gums.
B. so that +clause (two different subjects) So that +not/ lest +should	He goes to the dentist every six months so that he won't have any cavities. The procedure also involves inspecting the gums so that the doctor can detect any signs of gingivitis and periodontal diseases. I'll do this procedure lest the incisors should be affected .
Special structures: which results in/resulting in	Some people skip brushing before going to bed, which results in bacteria irritating their gums and causing tooth decay. Some people skip brushing before going to bed, resulting in bacteria irritating their gums and causing tooth decay.
